Directions: During the Summer of 2022 you are required to read **two** books of your choosing. These books must be grade appropriate. Don't be afraid to challenge yourself! :) For one book, you will be completing a writing template that is provided to you in the Google Doc. For the second book, you will create a mini-project that will be presented at the beginning of the school year.

Book One- Writing Template

- Choose 5 questions to respond to based on the book you are reading. You may answer questions as you read your book, as some of the questions ask you to predict what happens next, etc.
- You have your own copy of the template at the bottom of this Doc.
- Type the question you have selected **and** your response
- **Your responses MUST be 8-10 sentences long. This MUST be your best effort. (Advice: use the R.A.C.E. writing strategy: Restate the question, Answer ALL parts of the question, Cite evidence from the text, Explain your evidence).**
- Complete a minimum of 5 questions per book, you are welcome to do more
 - to add lines to your template simply right click on the bottom row and select "insert row below"
